About Blackfoot language:

- The Blackfoot language, or Siksiká, is an Algonquian language spoken by the Blackfoot or Niitsitapi people in the northwestern plains of North America.
- There are four dialects of the Blackfoot language, with three spoken in Alberta, Canada (Siksiká, Kainai, Aapátohsipikani) and one in the United States (Aamsskáápipikani).
 - Siksiká is spoken southeast of Calgary, Kainai between Cardston and Lethbridge in Alberta, Aapátohsipikani west of Fort MacLeod, and Aamsskáápipikani in northwestern Montana.
- The name "Blackfoot" is likely derived from the **blackened soles of the leather shoes** traditionally worn by the people.
- It is identified as a **pitch accent language**, indicating that pitch variations play a significant role in distinguishing word meanings.
- The language has witnessed a decline in native speakers since the 1960s, leading to its classification as "severely endangered" by the UNESCO Atlas of the World's Languages in Danger.
