


# Kudavolai Electoral System

## Kudavolai Electoral System

Tamil Nadu's tableau in the Republic Day parade showcased the historical significance of the Kudavolai electoral system.



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## About Kudavolai Electoral System:

- Emerged during the **Chola era**, the Kudavolai system was utilized to **elect representatives** responsible for village administration.
- The system effectively conveyed the collective will of the people to the empire.
- Historical evidence for the Kudavolai system is documented in the **Uttaramerur inscriptions** located in **Kanchipuram district**.

#### Key features of the system:

- Villagers actively participated in the administration, resembling the modern Panchayat Raj system.
- The village was divided into 30 wards, and **residents from these wards** gathered to select one representative for the village assembly.

#### **Election Process:**

- Contestants' names were written on palm leaf tickets (volai), placed in a pot (kuda), and shuffled.
- A small boy randomly picked palm leaves to determine elected representatives.

#### **Qualifications for Representatives:**

- Ownership of a designated amount of land.
- Possession of a house.
- Age between 35 and 70.



- Knowledge of mantras and Brahmanas from the Vedic corpus.
- Exception made for those who learned at least one Veda and four Bhashyas.
- Proficiency in business and virtuous conduct.

### **Disqualifications:**

• The inscription lists disqualifications based on factors like **not submitting accounts**, committing **grave sins**, association with **outcastes**, and consumption of **forbidden dishes**.

## Limitations:

- While resembling a form of local self-governance, the system had limitations.
- Membership was restricted to a specific group of land-owning Brahmins.
- The selection process involved a draw of lots rather than true elections.

# About Uttaramerur inscriptions:

- Uttaramerur is situated in the present-day Kanchipuram district, Tamil Nadu.
  - It is known for its historic temples built during Pallava and Chola rule.
- The town houses the renowned Vaikunda Perumal Temple, where an inscription from Parantaka I's reign provides valuable insights into the functioning of the local sabha (village assembly).
- The Uttaramerur inscription outlines the **structure**, **selection process**, **and responsibilities** of the local sabha, specifically comprised of Brahmins.
