Pygmy hogs

Captive-bred pygmy hogs, the smallest and rarest pigs on earth, were recently released in Assam's Manas National Park and Tiger Reserve under Pygmy Hog Conservation Programme (PHCP).

About the Pygmy hog:

- It is a suid native to alluvial grasslands in the foothills of Himalayas at elevations of up to 300 m.
- Its population is estimated at **less than 250 mature individuals** in Assam and possibly southern **Bhutan** and **Nepal.**
- Appearance: It has coats having blackish-brown bristles over gray-brown skin and no facial warts.
 - The head is sharply tapered and adult males have visible upper canines on the sides of their mouths.
- Habitat: It is extremely shy and secretive in the wild as stays hidden in tall dense grass, having
 a mixture of shrubs and trees.
 - The family groups live in high dome-shaped thatch nests made of grass and other vegetation, rather than farrow like other pigs.
- Diet: (Omnivores) Roots, tubers, insects, rodents, and small reptiles.
- **Threats:** Habitat loss through human settlement, overgrazing of livestock, commercial forestry, flood control projects, agricultural encroachment and burning of grasslands.

Conservation Status:

- IUCN: Endangered (EN)
- Wildlife Protection Act (WPA): Schedule I

About Pygmy Hog Conservation Programme (PHCP):

- It was started **near Guwahati** in **1996** under which males and females were captured from the Manas National Park.
- The reintroduction of captive-bred hogs to the wild began in 2008 and has been conducted annually since 2020.



- The target is to reintroduce 60 pygmy hogs in Manas, its historical habitat, by 2025.
- This would **boost** the **rewilding of Manas** through more investment in the **scientific** management of grasslands.
- It will benefit **grassland-associated species** like Bengal florican, hispid hare, hog deer, and Indian rhino.

About Manas Biosphere & Tiger Reserve:

- It is a protected area located in Western Assam at the foothills of Eastern Himalayas.
- It was among the **first nine tiger reserves** to be notified when **Project Tiger** started in **1973** and inscribed as a **UNESCO World Heritage Site** in 1985.
- Location: Royal Manas National Park of Bhutan by the River Manas and its tributaries- **Beki** and **Hakua** in the north.
 - Buxa Tiger Reserve of West Bengal by the River Sankosh in the west.
- It was notified as a **Biosphere Reserve (1989)** under United Nations Man and Biosphere (**MAB**) Programme, and an Important Bird Area (**IBA**) by Birdlife International (2004).
- **Flora:** Sal, Khair-Sisoo, scrub forests, semi-evergreen and mixed deciduous forests, interspersed with grasslands and riparian vegetation.
- **Fauna:** Indian elephants, Bengal Tiger, Indian rhinoceros, clouded leopards, golden langurs, Assamese macaques, rhesus macaque, slow loris, hoolock gibbons, Indian pangolin, Chinese pangolin, etc.
